Exodus 5

²²Moses returned to the LORD and said, “O Lord, why have you brought trouble upon this people? Is this why you sent me? ²³Ever since I went to Pharaoh to speak in your name, he has brought trouble upon this people, and you have not rescued your people at all.”

Exodus 6

¹Then the LORD said to Moses, “Now you will see what I will do to Pharaoh: Because of my mighty hand he will let them go; because of my mighty hand he will drive them out of his country.”

²God also said to Moses, “I am the LORD. ³I appeared to Abraham, to Isaac and to Jacob as God Almighty, but by my name the LORD I did not make myself known to them. ⁴I also established my covenant with them to give them the land of Canaan, where they lived as aliens. ⁵Moreover, I have heard the groaning of the Israelites, whom the Egyptians are enslaving, and I have remembered my covenant.

⁶“Therefore, say to the Israelites: ‘I am the LORD, and I will bring you out from under the yoke of the Egyptians. I will free you from being slaves to them, and I will redeem you

with an outstretched arm and with mighty acts of judgment. ⁷I will take you as my own people, and I will be your God. Then you will know that I am the LORD your God, who brought you out from under the yoke of the Egyptians. ⁸And I will bring you to the land I swore with uplifted hand to give to Abraham, to Isaac and to Jacob. I will give it to you as a possession. I am the LORD.’”

⁹Moses reported this to the Israelites, but they did not listen to him because of their discouragement and cruel bondage.

¹⁰Then the LORD said to Moses, ¹¹“Go, tell Pharaoh king of Egypt to let the Israelites go out of his country.”

¹²But Moses said to the LORD, “If the Israelites will not listen to me, why would Pharaoh listen to me, since I speak with faltering lips?”

Exodus 5:22-6:12

CRAFT/ACTIVITY: PHARAOH'S CROWN

Students will make a crown to remind them that Moses went to Pharaoh to tell him to let the Israelites go.

MATERIALS

1. 67 lb. Cardstock
2. Pharaoh's Crown Pattern
3. Markers, Crayons, or Colored Pencils
4. Glue and/or Tape
5. Assorted Stickers (Optional)
6. Glitter (Optional)
7. Scissors



DIRECTIONS

1. Make a copy of "Pharaoh's Crown" on 67 lb. cardstock for each student.
2. Have students color the crown with markers, crayons, or colored pencils.
3. Decorate the crown with glitter and/or stickers (optional).
4. Cut out the three pieces.
5. Glue or tape the three pieces together end-to-end.

FOR DISCUSSION

As students are working on their crowns, remind them that the Israelites were enslaved in Egypt at the time. Pharaoh was afraid that the Israelites would become too numerous and so he ordered that all Hebrew babies be put to death. Moses had already asked Pharaoh to let the Israelites go into the desert to hold a festival for the Lord. Pharaoh had refused. Pharaoh ordered that the bricks that the Israelites were making be made without straw. They also had to make more bricks than before. Moses now had to go before Pharaoh again to tell him to let the Israelites go. Through all this, God was with the Israelites even in times of trial.






USE THE STRIP BELOW TO MAKE THE CROWN BIGGER IF NECESSARY


